## From Our Pastor

<sup>46</sup>Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, <sup>47</sup>praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number....Acts 2:46-47

As we gather for this year's Annual Meeting, we have many reasons to praise God, reflected in the ways our mission guides our life together as a congregation.

**"To Love"** describes our care for each other. We received new members in January and November, welcoming 6 adults and 2 children, and we regularly meet newcomers at Sunday worship. While we cannot know what impact we've had on each of them, a visitor this fall, passing through Wilmington for work, was moved to tears by the sense of welcome she received. Beyond Sunday mornings, I am excited by new opportunities to care for our children and young families through "Monday School" and other faith formation activities.

**"To Invite"** directs our focus outward, as we build new relationships in the neighborhood. Last spring we partnered with Westminster Presbyterian to host 14 elementary-aged kids (including 2 from St Stephen's) for our inaugural "Kids in the Pantry" program. The League of Women Voters offered 3 voter registration drives this fall during food pantry hours. They were thrilled with the response they received, and we were able to provide an important service to food pantry clients. An inquiry from a neighbor in an adjacent apartment building led to inviting Sahr Abu, proprietor of Sunrise Yoga, to offer classes in our Gathering Space during cold weather months when they cannot meet outside.

encompasses our work in the world around



us. The food pantry is our most prominent example of service. Several St Stephen's members are regular volunteers and Kanchalee makes "loaves and fishes" miracles seem commonplace. But did you know we provide chairs every Memorial Day for the City of Wilmington's observance at the Soldiers and Sailors Monument? Sharing space with Abundant Life Faith Center and New Jerusalem are other acts of genuine service, as life-giving to these other congregations as to us.

These are only a few examples of the ways we lived into our mission in 2024. Other examples include representing at DE Pride Day, hosting Pacem Peace Art, and sharing our pulpit with speakers from vulnerable communities. These ministries are all made possible by the collaborative work of our staff, the faithful leadership of our church council, the compassionate generosity of St Stephen's people, and God's grace which continues to bless our congregation.

# PEACE OF PIZZA FOOD PANTRY PEACE ART

148 people attended Peace of Pizza in October. They ate 272 slices of pizza, 145 ice cream treats, 73 cups of coffee, 112 soda cans and 83 bottles of water. Volunteers, including Tom Strayer, Ken Nicholson and Amy Johnson, served 5, 173 hours. The pantry received \$42,063 in inkind food donations and \$38,830 in nonfood donations. St. Stephen's hosted 14 art pieces as part of the Pacem in Terris Visionary Youth Peace Art Exhibition.
